## BOOK REVIEWS

A Note to Parents

Once a month, the students in grades 1-4 will be required to submit a book review on one of the books they have read for their Reading Challenge. They may choose from 5 different ways to show their comprehension of a book. Each option is given a certain amount of points which are added to their Reading grade.

1. A written book report (format given by teacher)
2. An oral review (format given by teacher)
3. A diorama that depicts the climax or a series of important events in the story.
4. A picture book with words and illustrations that condense the book into the student's own interpretation. This must include important events from the beginning, middle and end of the book. Book should be at least 5 pages long, not including the cover.
5. A Power Point that includes pictures and written or spoken highlights from the book. Pictures can be photos of actual pictures in the book, pictures from the internet, or ones that are drawn by hand then photographed. Music can be added as well. Presentation should be no longer than 5 minutes.
6. A T-Shirt Book Report (format given by teacher)
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**Keep in mind Philippians 4:8 when choosing books to read.

Your oral book review will be graded on the following areas:

1. Speak in a clear and interesting voice - no monotones.
2. Speak loud enough for someone in the back of the room to hear you.
3. Stand straight with your hands by your sides.
4. Follow the outline above.
5. Look at your audience.
6. Make your review flow smoothly with very few "ums" and "ya knows".
7. Include events from the beginning, middle and end of the book.
8. Sell your book - even if you didn't like it!

## READING CHALLENGE!!

Reading truly is fundamental. If a child can read, all the other subjects seem so much easier and success is inevitable. And everyone likes to feel successful. So this year, grades 1-4 will participate in a Reading Challenge Program. This is not optional, but a requirement for the completion of Reading Class. Each student will receive a Reading Challenge Sheet which they will return to school by the end of each school week. At the top will be goals for each child at their particular grade level. A weekly assignment will help each child to reach their weekly, monthly, and eventually their goal for the entire school year. When the child completes each goal, whether it is for the week or the month, there will be a reward. When a student completes 100 pages, a marble is put into a jar for even more rewards for the class. Students cannot count regular reading assignments for English, or Social Studies, or any other subjects. This is extra reading, either using our library resources or books from home or from your local library. Please help us monitor your child's choices. Books should inspire and uplift, teach values and important life lessons. The books these children read should draw them closer to Jesus. Non-fiction and biographies are usually the best.
** Notice that there is a column for parent's initials. That is the ONLY place you need to sign. It is very important that you encourage and monitor your child's reading progress. Thank you for your help at home. **
** If a student fails to return their log at the end of the school week, he/she will be required to read during their Free Time at school, unless the teacher receives a note from the parent stating that the child has completed the assignment. In such a case, the Reading Log still needs to be returned on the next school day. If the log is returned and the assignment has not been completed, the students will complete the reading during their Free Time and the teacher will initial when completed..***
"Whatever things are true, whatever things are just, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report, if there is any virtue and if there is anything praiseworthy meditate on these things." Philippians 4:8

I would like to remind the students that this verse should be their guideline, their standard, as they choose books to read for their Reading Challenge, and especially to present for their Book Reviews each month. The choices they make now could last a lifetime so we should do all we can to encourage them to select the right path.
If a book is not appropriate for a student to read, then it is definitely not appropriate to share. Our Book Review time is a wonderful opportunity for the students to present quality reading material to their fellow students. Hopefully, the information gleaned from their reading will be uplifting and inspiring and will motivate more positive book selections.
